

## San Diego Chapter





Join us for this all day ride to this historic location. Cook's Corner is considered to be one of the most famous biker bar & restaurant in Southern California. It is located at the juncture of Santiago Canyon and Live Oak Canyon roads. They've experienced major earthquakes, forest fires, floods, recessions and other disasters. They've gotten through all of them and came out stronger. The ride will take us up the 5 along the coast until we head inland just north of San Clemente. After lunch, experience the twisties of Ortega Hwy before we head back south.

The ride will include 2 gas stops and will cover a total of 190 miles ending back at IMSD.

Fun Fact: Its first known use was as a converted beekeeper's cabin in 1926, across the street from its current location on the corner of Live Oak and Santiago Canyon roads, serving as a food supply for ranchers and miners. Then, after Prohibition ended, it was a burger joint with a full bar. When Earl Jack Cook bought a World War II mess hall from the Santa Ana Army Air Base, he moved it to El Toro Road in 1946 where the adored wooden building stands today.



From the editor: This months board member focus is the most difficult one to write as it is your Editor / Treasurer but some of you may not know me or my background. The name Sardine is to honor my other grandfather who I always enjoyed a sardine sandwich, chips & a beer with. Sardine also traveled 11,291 miles through 34 states with me back in the summer of 2022. Now I'm looking forward to putting more miles on both bikes this year with all the great events coming up. 
